We know that young people's lives are enriched and enhanced when they are introduced to new languages, cultures, and experiences — to broaden their view of the world and help them develop.

It is a testament to your commitment and resilience that Rotary Youth Exchange survived the COVID-19 pandemic. We learned that even with obstacles and hardships, our exchanges remain a vital part of Rotary's DNA. And through virtual exchanges, we were able to grow and learn how to be adaptive.

2022-23 PROGRAM STATISTICS

ABOUT THE DATA IN THIS REPORT

Rotary International asked district and multidistrict Rotary Youth Exchange leaders for information about their exchange programs in the 2022-23 Rotary year in July 2023. It's worth noting that this is the first Rotary Youth Exchange annual report since 2019-20 because exchanges were widely unavailable for the previous two years as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Though virtual exchanges were adopted, the participation rate was significantly decreased during this time, and no data was collected.


For 2022-23, we received responses from **449** of 468 districts that are certified to participate in Rotary Youth Exchange — a **96%** response rate. Of the 449 districts that responded, **356** said that they actively participated in long-term, short-term, or virtual exchanges during 2022-23. We'll call them “participating districts” throughout this report.

PROGRAM PARTICIPATION

Participating districts reported **5,664** exchanges in 2022-23.




NUMBER OF EXCHANGE STUDENTS HOSTED BY GEOGRAPHIC AREA



Increased participation from Rotary clubs to both host and send youth on exchanges is the single greatest factor in creating more and better exchanges through Rotary Youth Exchange. Increased club participation not only leads to more students getting involved in the program and benefiting from greater support, but it could also inspire other clubs and members to become more actively engaged with Rotary. Clubs can offer students opportunities to talk about their exchange experiences at club meetings or organize activities for students. Clubs that have Rotary Youth Exchange experience can work with clubs that are interested in hosting or sending students and help them get involved in the program — and more involved in Rotary.

Financial assistance in Rotary Youth Exchange

Although it's not required, many clubs and districts support students by paying for part or all of their exchange experience. In other cases, the students' families are expected to pay for their child's participation. Clubs and districts said that they spent a total of **US\$647,051** on financial support of exchanges in 2022-23.

100 districts around the world provided financial assistance to students going on exchange. The total number of students who received that financial assistance was **676**. The average number of students who received financial assistance from districts that provided it was **25** students per district.

Rotary Youth Exchange students with a family member in Rotary


Participating districts reported that **961** Rotary Youth Exchange students, or 17%, had a family member in Rotary, while **4,741** (83%) did not. This proportion is consistent with those of previous years and proves that Rotary Youth Exchange continues to be a program that expands Rotary's reach.

The opportunity to expand our reach and build public awareness of Rotary through our student exchange program is significant. Finding new and innovative ways to engage students whose families may not be familiar with Rotary can foster new relationships with Rotary and encourage a more diverse, equitable, and inclusive environment in Rotary.

The Rotary Youth Exchange program still has the opportunity to grow through club participation. Increased club participation would not only lead to more students getting involved in the program and benefiting from greater support, but it could also inspire existing clubs and members to become more actively engaged with Rotary. Inviting students to share their exchange experience at a club meeting, organizing activities for inbound students, or perhaps having a veteran club work with a club interested in hosting a student are just some of the ways more clubs can become and feel more involved in the program — and in Rotary.

District partnerships

No matter how hard local districts and clubs work to send a young person on exchange, they also need a trustworthy and reliable partner district in another country or region that can receive them. And in most cases, districts have many partner districts in various regions and countries. In 2022-23, **districts had an average of nine partner districts** they worked with to allow their students many possibilities.

In 2022-23, 297 (83%) of participating districts reported that they both hosted students and sent students abroad on exchanges. This is called reciprocal exchange.

ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE IS BACK!

After a two-year hiatus, Rotary Youth Exchange, Rotary’s exchange program for students age 15-19, has resumed in-person exchanges. As we came to terms with the realities of the pandemic in early 2020, new in-person exchanges were paused indefinitely. With the development and distribution of vaccines worldwide, the Rotary International Board of Directors allowed exchanges to resume in the 2022-23 Rotary year.



PROGRAM REACH AND IMPACT

VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT



Volunteer engagement

To understand how Rotary Youth Exchange expands Rotary’s reach and its ability to engage communities around the world, we asked participating districts to tell us how many volunteers participated in the program in 2022-23. A total of **18,975** volunteers, both Rotary members and nonmembers, were involved in the program. Of the volunteers, **7,790**, or **41%**, were nonmembers.

HOST FAMILY STORY WE ARE FAMILY: ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE

Host families are always a vital part of a successful long-term exchange. They help students experience a new culture while also providing for their overall well-being and safety. Supporting host families as much as we support students is an important part of maintaining a healthy Rotary Youth Exchange program.



Host family engagement

More than **8,700** of the reported volunteers hosted exchange students in 2022-23. Of all host families, **3,673 (42%)** included at least one Rotary member, and **5,065 (58%)** were made up of nonmembers. (Note that some short-term exchanges, such as short-term camps or short-term tours, do not include a host family experience.)

The table shows the percentage of host families by region, arranged by those who were members of Rotary and those who were not. In Asia and Oceania, the majority of host families had a parent who was a member of Rotary, while the majority of families volunteering to host students in Africa, Europe, and North and South America did not have a parent who was a member of Rotary.

Host school involvement

Long-term exchange students attend school in their host countries. This gives them the opportunity to connect with peers and teachers while experiencing academic life in a new culture and, often, a different language. Students may be placed in various types of schools, depending on their goals. Most often, students can expect to attend a public school (usually state-funded), but in some cases they may attend a private school (often funded through tuition or other sources) or a school that focuses on the arts or vocations.

ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE: YOUR PASSPORT TO ADVENTURE

What the program offers to and asks of participants — an openness to new ideas and experiences, a willingness to adapt and to gain new perspectives, and an opportunity to make new friends and learn new ways of living — are the same values that define Rotary itself.

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS

Contributing to the care and development of the host community is an important part of a Rotary Youth Exchange. In 2022-23, **225** participating districts, or about **63%**, reported that they involved their inbound students in community service projects.



Cleaned up and helped repair community parks and planted plant pollinator gardens and trees



Cleaned up waste along beaches and riverfronts and in public spaces



Visited and socialized with patients in nursing homes and children's wards in hospitals



Raised funds for causes and organizations including End Polio Now, ShelterBox, homeless shelters, and sending medical supplies to victims of floods and earthquakes



Gathered and donated household items for refugees




Packed food and necessities into bags for people in flooded areas and collected and packed donations for food donation centers



LONG-TERM EXCHANGES

Long-term exchanges usually last a full academic year. In 2022-23, **220** participating districts hosted **3,875** long-term exchanges, representing **69%** of all Rotary Youth Exchange activity.

2022-23 LONG-TERM EXCHANGES BY HOST REGION





Long-term exchange trends and challenges

As the world continued to emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic in 2022-23, the total number of exchanges was lower than in the most recent years of the program's full operation.

Community interest and participation, especially that of students and clubs, are vital to the growth of Rotary Youth Exchange.

Top reasons for increases in long-term exchanges:

1. Increased interest from prospective participants
2. Relaxation of restrictions prompted by the COVID-19 pandemic
3. Stronger relationships with partner districts


Top reasons for decreases in long-term exchanges:

1. Lack of interested exchange candidates
2. Reluctance to participate due to COVID-19
3. Lack of interest by clubs

SHORT-TERM EXCHANGES

Short-term exchanges last from several days to a few months. They often take the form of a camp, tour, or homestay and take place when school isn't in session. In 2022-23, **167** participating districts hosted **1,759** short-term exchanges, representing **31%** of all Rotary Youth Exchanges.

2022-23 SHORT-TERM EXCHANGES HOSTED BY REGION





VIRTUAL EXCHANGES

Virtual exchanges are an alternative to in-person exchanges that offer young people unique opportunities to interact and collaborate with people from other cultures and communities online. When they are structured and safe and are developed with specific goals in mind, virtual exchange experiences can be just as valuable as physically going abroad.

Though it was the pandemic that spurred the creation of virtual exchanges as a Rotary Youth Exchange option, they remain a wonderful way to offer young people — especially young people who are underserved, underrepresented, or marginalized — chances to engage in meaningful conversations that promote respect and understanding across cultures. They can also help students challenge stereotypes, increase empathy, and develop intercultural competencies, all of which can help them develop the knowledge and skills they need in order to become global citizens and peacebuilders.

In 2022-23, **5** participating districts hosted **30** virtual exchanges, representing **0.5%** of all Rotary Youth Exchanges.



ENDING AN EXCHANGE EARLY

REASONS FOR ENDING AN EXCHANGE EARLY



Participating districts reported that **349** exchanges, or **6%**, ended early in 2022-23.

Homesickness was the most frequent reason given for students returning early from their exchanges.

ROTARY'S COMMITMENT TO YOUTH PROTECTION

The safety and well-being of young people and youth program participants are Rotary's highest priority. Rotary International has a zero-tolerance policy for abuse and harassment of young people.

Statement of Conduct for Working With Youth

Rotary International strives to create and maintain a safe environment for all youth who participate in Rotary activities. To the best of their ability, Rotary members, their partners, and other volunteers must safeguard the children and young people with whom they come into contact and protect them from physical, sexual, and psychological abuse.

Reporting incidents to Rotary allows our Youth Protection staff to guide local leaders in responding to, investigating, and resolving these matters in accordance with our youth protection policies and procedures. Reporting also allows Rotary staff to monitor members when appropriate and prohibit them from interacting with youth if they are found to have violated policy.

What is reported to Rotary International?

Rotary encourages anyone who has a youth protection concern to use our online form to report it. Follow the link on our [Youth Protection page](#) to get to the form. Reports can even be submitted anonymously. Reported concerns may involve any minor who is participating in Rotary in any way, whether by being a Rotary Youth Exchange student, attending a RYLA camp, belonging to an Interact club, or even just attending a Rotary club meeting. We require our members to report any allegations of abuse, harassment, or misconduct that involve a minor in Rotary, as well as medical incidents, accidents, Rotary Youth Exchange early returns, and allegations against Rotary members that involve minors and arise outside of Rotary programming.

Trends in youth protection during 2022-23

Even the most robust, proactive youth protection efforts cannot prevent all misconduct, accidents, and other youth protection concerns. Thorough reviews of each situation and a commitment to taking corrective action ensure that we do everything we can to prevent any problems from happening again.

Rotary International supports districts that are involved in Rotary Youth Exchange by analyzing trends in the youth protection concerns that are reported around the world so we can identify potential root causes and develop resources and support to reduce risk and keep our young participants safe. We are responding to growing trends and redoubling our efforts related to some key issues, as follows:

Mental health and coping strategies. According to the World Health Organization, 1 in 8 people worldwide lived with a mental health disorder in 2019. Young people who are away from their support systems and experiencing the stressors of life abroad are even more susceptible to mental health challenges. Host family challenges. Placing students with willing and enthusiastic host families is vital to the success of an exchange. And recruiting safe, welcoming, respectful, and supportive families that can bear the financial responsibility of hosting has become more difficult. Most important, we want to place students with families that want to host, not ones that need to be incentivized or persuaded to host, which could result in tension, hostility, or a lack of support for our students. Before families commit to hosting, make sure to discuss with them the added responsibility, challenges, and costs of hosting and the tools that are in place to enhance the exchange experience for everyone. Community grooming. “Grooming” is when a predator establishes an emotional connection with a potential target to lower their inhibitions and gain their trust, with the intent to be sexually abusive. But did you know that predators also groom the community? They may do anything they can to earn the trust of those around them, and they often are respected members of the community who are charming, successful, and helpful. Caring adults who are committed to working with youth may not notice the warning signs, because they sometimes find it difficult to believe that others would abuse the trust placed in them. They may even dismiss allegations without investigating them thoroughly — especially when the accused person is a friend or family member or is highly respected. Recognizing the signs of abuse, investigating every allegation that is made in good faith, and holding

everyone accountable to the same standards are all critical to avoiding the pitfalls of community grooming. To learn more, including how to respond to signs of community grooming, read chapter 4 of our [Youth Protection Guide](#).

Barriers to reporting

The decision to report harassment or abuse is a personal decision, and it can be a difficult one, especially for young people living in a different country, culture, and language. Young people especially tend to minimize and deny abuse, not exaggerate or over-report incidents. People who have experienced trauma may not report it for many reasons, so it’s especially important to recognize the signs of abuse and barriers to reporting. Reaffirm your commitment to reporting, investigating, and follow-through for any and all youth protection concerns that are expressed in good faith.

ALUMNI OF ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE

In 2022-23, **289** districts, or **81%** of participating districts, reported actively engaging Rotary Youth Exchange alumni in some way after they completed their exchanges. These alumni are often referred to as Rotex. They are frequently asked to serve as volunteers for district-organized Rotary Youth Exchange events or invited to participate in other Rotary youth programs in service projects and club events.

Top ways Rotary Youth Exchange alumni were engaged by Rotary or Rotaract clubs:

1. Student orientation (246 alumni)
2. District conferences (184 alumni)
3. Orientation for students returning home (163 alumni)

District leaders said that 1,791 of the 5,664 students who participated in Rotary Youth Exchange in 2022-23 planned to participate in other Rotary programs, like Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) or Interact, in the future.


